GIFTS OF LOVE

They enter with the hope of immediate relief, but leave with a hope for a new life.

Ted Johnson, a representative of the Star of Hope Shelters, accepted our gifts of books and toys, along with the Blanket of Love created by Eta Delta sisters. As Johnson explained the aims, mission, and programs of the Star of Hope, the appropriateness of the name became more significant.

The Star of Hope is more than a shelter with a bowl of soup—it's a lifestyle rescue. Those who enter the shelter must also seek longterm assistance as well. Immediate needs of food, clothing, and safe shelter met, the individuals enter the program. Substance abuse—the shelter has a ninety-day program. Domestic abuseparenting classes and nutrition and cooking classes. Jobless-earn a GED, develop or update skills with classes.

The average stay is up to nine months, but once the people leave the shelter, they rarely return because they have been better prepared to live in society and to be a contributing member in that society.

The Star of Hope shelter needs yearround donations of food, clothing, diapers, school supplies, books and toys—anything except furniture. If you use it, they need it. Giving at the holiday season makes us feel good for contributing, but for places like the Star of Hope, they need the giving of the holidays all year long.

Morgan when his mother Mary Sherman Morgan died in 2004. Appalled, George set out to find concrete proof. *Rocket Girl: The* Story of Mary Sherman *Morgan* is her son's biography of America's First Female Rocket Scientist.

Fifty-seven years ago, life on earth changed forever. October 6, 1957, Russia launched *Sputnik*, the first orbiting satellite: the space race was on *and America wasn't even at the starting gate!* Two people were significant in early space exploration: Walter von Braun and Mary Sherman Morgan. Everyone knows about von Braun, but who is Mary Sherman Morgan?

She invented hydyne, the rocket propellant that boosted America's first satellite *Explorer I* into orbit on January 31, 1958—just three months after *Sputnik*!

Recommended by Carol Gillingham, *Rocket Girl* is an intriguing look at the life of an unknown pioneer of the American space program.
