*In this Hospitable Land* by Lynmar Brock, Jr., is a work of fiction based on a true story of a family during WWII. It is a reminder that "not every story of the Second World war involves incarceration and death. Many are the sorrowful tales of successful lives abandoned, new identities assumed, and the desperate struggle to survive in alien surroundings."

The Sauverins are well-to-do non-practicing Jews, who until May 1940 cling to the hope that Belgium's neutrality would keep the Nazis away. André Sauverin, a pacifist, is an assistant professor and head of the analytical chemistry lab at the Free University in Brussels, a place of unfettered intellectual pursuit. "Just in case," the family has already gone to Le Coq along the coast between French and Dutch borders. André's hope for peace is shattered as wave after wave of Nazi planes bomb Brussels. André must face the truth that "the moment when one's ideals are most sorely tested is the moment one must cling to them most strongly."

Leisurely, the Sauverin family—all ten of them packs into a "1938 Buick 57 in superb working order" and pulling a trailer with their belongings head for a friend's villa near Paris. Parents Louis and Rose Sauverin, son André and his wife Denise and two children, son Alex and his wife Geneviève and two children leave as if on a family vacation. Crossing borders takes longer for them because of their varied passports: André and Rose (Belgian), Alex and Louis (Dutch), and sisters Denise and Geneviève (British).

When Hitler's Nazis invades Paris, the Sauverins move to Cévennes further south. The Cévenols, descendants of Protestant Hugenots, struggled to survive, yet "they took in, hid, and protected many" such as the Sauverins. During the years the Sauverins remain in hiding, they learn to live off the land just as the residents; they become peasants in dress and life style. Alex willingly becomes involved in the Resistance; André grudgingly—he refuses to kill, but he will do anything else.

Brock has first-hand knowledge of the family's struggle because it is the story of his wife's family. He returned to France and interviewed families still living, examined photo albums, visited the sites that protected the Sauverins (he changes the family name), and gained a better understanding of the sacrifices made in times of war.

Life in war is never easy, but having a network of support makes the sacrifices more bearable.

## DO NOT USE MAPQUEST!! YOU WILL END UP IN SIBERIA

FROM I-10 WEST: IF THERE ARE NO SIGNS THAT SAY I-10 AT 99 IS CLOSED: TAKE I-10 WEST AND TAKE THE hwy 99 exit. You will go up on a high ramp and then take the third exit, Cinco Ranch Blvd. Take a right on Cinco Ranch Blvd. IF THERE *ARE* SIGNS SAYING THAT I-10 AT 99 *IS* CLOSED, then take Fry Rd exit, which is right after Greenhouse Rd. Turn left on to Fry Rd under the underpass and go approx. a mile to Kingsland Blvd. Take a RIGHT on to Kingsland until you get to 99. Go LEFT under the underpass at Kingsland and get on 99. Then take the Cinco Ranch Blvd exit and turn RIGHT.

**FROM WESTPARK TOLLWAY:** Go west on Westpark Tollway and get off at the Grand Parkway exit. Take a RIGHT on to the feeder and then get on 99 straight until you take the Cinco Ranch Blvd. exit, take it and turn LEFT on to Cinco Ranch Blvd.

**FROM WESTHEIMER to WESTHEIMER PARKWAY:** Go west on Westheimer. Cross over Hwy 6 and take a RIGHT at the first light, which is Westheimer Parkway. Stay on this for about 10 miles. Go UNDER the 99 overpass and stay on Westheimer Parkway. Go up to Cinco Ranch Blvd. and take a LEFT onto Cinco Ranch Blvd.

FROM CINCO RANCH BLVD. : If coming from

Hwy 99, go THROUGH THE LIGHT at Westheimer Parkway, and stay on Cinco Ranch Blvd. Coming from Westheimer Parkway, take a LEFT on to Cinco Ranch Blvd. After you cross over two short bridges, take a LEFT at the first LEFT-HAND turn lane into HERITAGE GRAND subdivision. Take a RIGHT at the stop sign. Curve around and take a RIGHT at the second street, Marsden Park. Curve around and take a LEFT at the first street, Valley Bluff Lane. I am the last house on the right before it curves into the Cul-de-Sac. I have a small garden flag next to the garage.
