Most Memorable First Day as a Teacher

During the summer of 1970, Houston ISD notified me that I had been transferred to M.C. Williams Jr. - Sr. High School in Acres Homes in its effort to comply with the federally-mandated laws concerning desegregation of public schools. We Houston teachers called it The Big Crossover. Although I had taught for eight years in the district, the interpretation of seniority that one year was determined to be years within individual schools and within individual departments.

Resigned to the fact that this was my new assignment, I reported to my new school for the first faculty meeting, not knowing a soul there—but then, neither did a third of the other teachers there. Even though I missed the usual warm camaraderie of first day greetings among co-workers of past first days, I settled in my seat in the library for the meeting, which began with perfunctory welcomes, introductions of staff members, etc. Then a minister from the community addressed us in a shocking rant. He began by telling us not to come there like missionaries trying to save them from ignorance and eventually advising us to carry a butcher knife beside us on the seat when we drove back and forth to school with the doors locked and the windows rolled up. At that point, we "new" teachers sat up in our seats and looked at each other, as if to say, "Did he just say what I think he said?" It was obvious that he did not like the change of course for his neighborhood school and wanted to intimidate us "new" teachers to the point of not returning. His attitude was that too many of the school's *most* experienced teachers had been lured away and then replaced with us *inexperienced* teachers. From that moment, I sensed that it was going to be a very long, grueling year.

Chaos and defiance are etched in my memory of the first day there with students. Just trying to get them to come into the classroom and sit down was a monumental task. The students wanted to see the familiar faces of their previous teachers and made sure we "new teachers" knew it. previous experience had been with grades 7-10, but this year I was teaching juniors and seniors and had a senior homeroom. The guys loomed over me, as did some of the girls. But having dealt with seven brothers growing up, I was determined to assert myself from the start. I was a bit uneasy though when that minister's son took his seat in my homeroom and in my English class; however, to my surprise he was not only smart, but respectful. He was the least of my worries!

That year was filled with many extreme ups and downs. Among the ups, while there I met some of my brightest students and some of the most compassionate, dedicated teachers of my forty years as a teacher. Looking back, I have no regrets of my six years there because experiences there helped shape me into being a better person and a better teacher.
